The Jumbunna Institute for Indigenous Education and Research

The Jumbunna Institute supports the academic aspirations of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander students at UTS. Jumbunna's vision is to create a place where all Indigenous Australians can access education, in a place that recognises their social, cultural and emotional well-being.

Jumbunna Student Support staff provide services to help students achieve their educational goals. The Learning Development (LD) team provides one-to-one and small group tutorials to assist students in their development of academic writing, referencing and presentation skills. These are delivered face to face during block and via email and Skype throughout the academic year.

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Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)

Duration: 3 years (6 sessions)

Teaching Mode: Intensive (3 x 1 week blocks per

WHAT IS THE BBA?

The BBA is an exciting away-from-base (block course) degree designed for Indigenous Australian professionals wishing to gain a degree qualification whilst working in their home community.

This applied project-based course recognises and builds upon a participants' current workforce expertise and Indigenous community knowledge. It is an ideal degree for those wanting to further their careers in business, management and leadership.

WHO IS THE BBA FOR?

Students selected to participate in the BBA will be:

 those currently employed within a range of sectors including private, public and community based organisations from around Australia

or

 those with previous work or study experience with a demonstrated commitment to learning.

WHY CHOOSE THE BBA?

- build upon your current workforce expertise and Indigenous community knowledge
- gain the skills to manage enterprises and organisations of the future taking into account Indigenous perspectives, cultural diversity and ethical standards
- benefit from the intensive mode of delivery, enabling you (with your employer's support), to maintain full-time employment while studying
- learn in a supportive, cohort-based study environment and collaborate with other Indigenous people who are business administrators, managers and leaders in their own right

EMPOWERING A FUTURE CAREER PATH

The BBA builds upon your current skills and professionalism, enabling you to take responsibility for empowering your own career paths, and to become exceptional managers, strong leaders and change agents within the wider Australian community.

The course will help enable you to:

- Apply the technical skills necessary for professional practice in business
- Develop and employ an informed professional approach to business and the management of organisations, with extensive business knowledge across a broad range of positions in both Indigenous and non-Indigenous contexts
- Acquire new skills in locating, designing, implementing and evaluating business opportunities and development programs for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and organisations
- Apply high level theory to practice in business and the management of organisations
- Develop the personal capacity to be assertive in your approach to personal development and leadership
- Be knowledgeable of the rights and perspectives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People in relation to business practice
- Demonstrate high level communication and self-reflection skills through the preparation of written and oral presentations to a variety of audiences
- Develop an awareness of the social, cultural, environmental and financial obligations that guide ethically responsible decisions in business



Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)

HOW THE COURSE IS TAUGHT

The BBA is structured as an intensive based program with students attending classes at UTS three times per session for a week at a time. It is expected that students will be highly independent and self-motivated learners able to maintain their study commitments while away from UTS.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Students complete 6 modules, each comprising 4 subjects. The course incorporates project subjects in each of the modules which are designed to challenge, consolidate and thoroughly deepen students' understanding of the core business functions, how they all interrelate, and are applied in the workplace or business settings.

Module 1

The first module, Integrating Business Skills, introduces the various core business disciplines including accounting, finance, economics and marketing, in an interdisciplinary setting. The objectives of this module are to introduce students to the business landscape, the interrelationships of the various business functions and the contributions to the value of the firm and society more broadly. The module also introduces the development of generic skills, including written, oral communication and team work skills.

Modules 2-5

These modules develop business management skills that align directly with the core functions of an organisation, namely:

- the management of the organisation and organisational structure;
- the management of people and the development of human capital;
- the management and oversight of the organisation's financial resources including sources of funding; and
- the management of its operations and supply chain including the consideration of financial and other operational risks an organisation may typically be faced with.

Module 6

The final module, Managing Innovation, brings together the knowledge developed throughout the course in the context of new venture creation and entrepreneurial activity.

EXIT POINTS

Exit points have been designed for students who may be unable to complete the full bachelor's degree. Upon successful completion of the first 3 modules, students may exit the program with a Diploma in Business Administration, or with successful completion of the first 4 modules, students may exit with an Advanced Diploma in Business Administration.

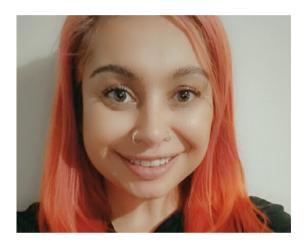

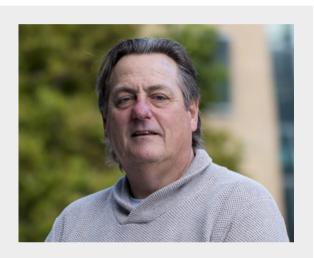

How to apply

Admission to the BBA is directly through UTS Business School.

APPLICATION

Interested students are provided the opportunity to demonstrate their capability for tertiary study through an assessment and interview process. Selection is also based on life experience, prior education and professional work experience.

Motivation to study and commitment to complete a tertiary degree is also taken into account. Please note that an ATAR or completion of year 12 is not a pre-requisite.
