

# Master of Engineering Management Fact Sheet

**The Master of Engineering Management is a one-year program and is open to non-engineers (does not contain any technical subjects). It can also be taken as part of a two-year program with the Master of Engineering Studies.**

**Course Information:** The Master of Engineering Management (MEM)<sup>1</sup> is the ideal course for you if you are interested in becoming a manager in whatever field your undergraduate degree is from. As there are no technical subjects, we welcome students from a non-engineering background.

**Course Structure:** The MEM is a one-year program (8 subjects). If you are interested in a two-year program, you can study the Master of Engineering Studies before or after the MEM.<sup>2</sup> Alternatively, you can undertake the MEM/MBA(Engineering Management & Policy).<sup>3</sup>

**Admission requirements:** you must have a general degree from a recognised university.

**In 2007 we have about 450 enrolments in the MEM.** This includes the offshore students in Hong Kong and China.

**NEWS:** UTS has been top ranked among Australian universities for excellence in teaching and learning by the Federal Government. UTS is one of only two universities in the country to be included in Band A1 in all four discipline groups of the Government's 2008 Learning and Teaching Performance Fund, announced on 3 October by the Minister for Education, Science and Training Julie Bishop. The fund was set up three years ago to reward universities based on the analysis of data on student satisfaction, student outcomes and student success. The assessment is across four groupings: science, computing, engineering, architecture and agriculture; business, law and economics; humanities, arts and education; health.<sup>4</sup>
