## World Innovation Summit for Health (WISH)

Professor James Buchan, Adjunct Professor has been appointed to a working group preparing an evidence paper for the fourth World Innovation

Summit for Health (WISH) which will take place on 13-14
November 2018 in Doha, hosted by the Qatar Foundation. The aims of the report will be to describe the potential and actual contribution of nurses and midwives to UHC, identify barriers that currently prevent nurses from making their maximum contribution to achieving UHC, and propose



practical methods for enabling nurses to maximise their contributions – highlighting innovations in practice and how this is achieved in a global context.

Co-chairs of the group are Lord Nigel Crisp, Co-Chair, All-Party Parliamentary Group on Global Health, UK House of Lords, and Sharon Brownie (co-chair), Dean, School of Nursing and Midwifery, Aga Khan University, East Africa.

# WHO recommendations: Intrapartum care for a positive birth experience

On 15 February, WHO issued a <u>press release</u> to launch new guidance on intrapartum care. This forms part of WHO's efforts to improve the quality of care around the time of childbirth in the SDG era. The guideline contains 56 recommendations related to supportive care throughout labour and childbirth; care during the first, second and third stages of labour; and immediate care of the woman and newborn after birth.

## Shaping the Future of Nursing

Yonsei University College of Nursing (CON) is hosting an international nursing conference (2018 YINC) in November.

This event will mark several special occasions for Yonsei CON: 30 years since the WHO CC was established there, 40 years since the first PhD in Nursing was started, and 50 years since the school gained 4-year college status. These amazing events are all "firsts" in Korean nursing.

The overall theme of the conference is Shaping the Future of Nursing: Pathway to serve the Public and Nursing Profession.

Aside from the plenary speakers, there will also be an exciting panel session on Nursing Development and Health Equity, with WHO CC experts.

## Midwifery Education in Cambodia

Provision of Technical Support to Strengthen the Quality of Midwifery Education in Cambodia - Workshops for Teaching Team and Midwifery Bridging Curriculum, March-April 2018.

To strengthen midwifery education and reduce the incidence of maternal and newborn mortality in Cambodia by 2020, the University of Technology Sydney (UTS) and their World Health Organization Collaborating Centre (WHOCC) has collaborated with the UNFPA Cambodia, Cambodian University of Health Sciences (UHS) and its Technical school of Medical Care (TSMC) to provide technical support to Cambodian midwives.

One key component of this work is to upgrade the qualifications of Cambodian midwifery educators to a Bachelor of Science in Midwifery through a Ministry of Health approved Bridging Curriculum. A Team Teaching Workshop (opened on 23 March) was also implemented to provide additional support and capacity building for national educators. The first sessions of the Midwifery Bridging Curriculum began in March, with fifty-two female midwives from urban and rural areas across Cambodia attending a series of lectures and workshops as part of the Bridging Curriculum.

Whilst in Phnom Penh, the UTS team met with key stakeholders from UNFPA. Two further in-country visits are planned for the UTS Team to work with national educators from TSMC to deliver the remaining subjects of the Midwifery

Bridging Curriculum. The next visit by members of the UTS Team (Ms Rachel Smith, Professor Caroline Homer, Professor Joanne Gray, Ms Vanessa Scarf and Ms Amanda Neill) is planned for June 2018, with a final visit and workshops in September 2018.

## Regional Medical Councils and Directors of Clinical Services

Senior health leaders from 22 Pacific Island countries and territories and international health professionals met in April in Nadi, Fiji, to review current issues and contribute towards decisions that impact regional health policy. For the first time ever, nurses were formally represented at these meetings through the South Pacific Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers Alliance (SPCNMOA) and the American Pacific Nursing Leaders Council (APNLC).

The Regional Medical Councils' (RMC) meeting covered challenges and opportunities experienced by the Australian and New Zealand Medical Councils, registration and licensing of clinical specialists and experiences outlined from the various Pacific Medical Councils.

The Directors of Clinical Services (DCS) meeting covered updates on regional clinical services, key issues impacting the delivery of clinical services in the region and an open discussion of related country perspectives and challenges. Partners provided updates on services to the Pacific Island Countries and plans for 2018; presentations covering regional cancer registry, dialysis options for Tuvalu, radiology across borders, regional procurement options, general practice and rural medicine.

The following recommendations were prioritised to address ongoing challenges for Pacific Nursing and Midwifery:

- Revision of nursing and midwifery services legislation and regulations;
- Establishing standards for educational quality, accreditation and continuous professional development;
- Establishing a regional registration framework practitioners/specialist programmes;
- A regional meeting of Pacific nursing and midwifery leaders to develop minimum standards in line with global standards.

The Directors of Clinical Services (DCS) meetings acknowledged the need for a regional mechanism for nursing and midwifery to provide continuing professional development, capacity building for training, protocols and standards development. A regional meeting has been planned for October 2018 alongside the South Pacific Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers Alliance meeting in the Cook Islands to review these recommendations and to update, discuss and plan effective programs for the Pacific in regulation, education, legislation and service delivery.

## Congratulations to Dr Isabelle Skinner of ICN

The appointment of Dr Isabelle Skinner as Chief Executive Officer of the International Nursing Council (ICN) was announced on June 4. Dr Skinner is a highly qualified and experienced nurse with a special commitment to improving rural and remote health.

Dr Skinner is currently a senior research fellow with James Cook University's Mount Isa Centre for Rural and Remote Health and has experience in nursing education, research and

leadership. She has worked with health teams and students in Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Singapore, Zimbabwe and China."This is an exciting time for nurses to use our collective voice to lead in transforming our health systems and improving the health of our global community" - Dr Skinner.

## Congratulations to Dr Barbara Stilwell of Nursing Now

Dr Barbara Stilwell has been appointed Nursing Now's new Executive Director. She brings enormous experience and expertise and will be invaluable in ensuring that Nursing Now remains a truly global campaign.
