Interview invitation to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Elders, leaders and caregivers



I am Megan Williams and am Wiradjuri through my father's family. I divide my time between Wiradjuri Country and Gadigal Country in NSW. I am a trained researcher and for over 20 years have focused on strategies to improve health and wellbeing of people in the criminal justice system.

I am part of the National Palliative Care in Prison (PiP) Project team.

I am seeking to interview Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from across NSW about experiences they have had supporting family or friends who may be sick in prison or who passed away in prison.





No material from interviews will identify anyone personally. I will share key points and quotes with the broader PiP Project team, so that we can:

- 1. Identify how to improve the care of people in prisons who are sick and may pass on
- 2. Find ways to support families of people in prison who get sick or pass on
- 3. Contribute NSW information to a broader National Framework being developed about palliative care in prison as part of a Commonwealth Department of Health project.
