Expert Consultation for Human Resources for Health 17 – 18 January 2023



During January 2023, the World Health Organization (WHO) Regional Office for the Western Pacific (WPRO) hosted an expert consultation to draft a renewed, regionally focused human resources for health (HRH) framework.

In the Western Pacific Region, past HRH developments have yielded positive results, including an increased number of health workers and emerging regulatory mechanisms. On the other hand, challenges ranging from ageing populations and increases in non-communicable diseases, to climate-based health emergencies and new modes and models of service delivery have stressed existing health workforce infrastructure. A revitalized framework, addressing emerging priorities through a primary care approach has been identified in the WPRO's working commitment to providing person-centred care and achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

Therefore, the WHO Regional Office commenced developing a regional framework for strengthening HRH. This framework offers an opportunity to move beyond numbers and reshape health workforce fit for the future of the Western Pacific Region. The meeting brought together key regional experts to review the draft framework and provide technical input.

14 December, 2022



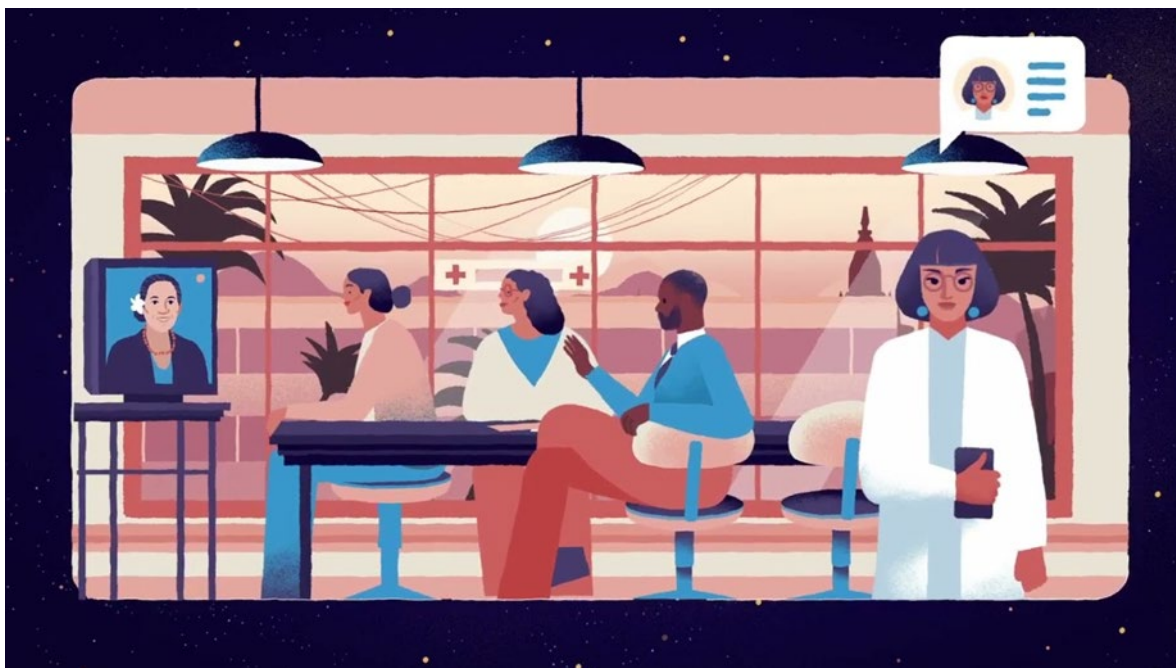

Prior to her appointment, Dr Amelia Latu was a member of the WHO Executive Board from 2020-2022. She was the first female Minister of Health of Tonga and first Tongan to receive a PhD in Nursing. Dr Tuipulotu has worked closely with WHO CC UTS, notably in her time as a Pacific Leadership Fellow and as Chair of the South Pacific Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers Alliance (SPCNMOA). The Centre congratulates Dr Tuipulotu on her appointment and celebrates her ongoing commitment to regional and global nursing and midwifery leadership outcomes.

As WHO's Chief Nursing Officer, Dr Tuipulotu will champion, nurture and support nurses and midwives to ensure that their skills and experience are being well utilized to strengthen health systems and to bolster their critical role in bringing patients, communities and national health systems closer together.

We would additionally like to express sincere appreciation of Ms Elizabeth Iro's vast contributions to global nursing and midwifery leadership in her tenure as Chief Nurse. Ms Iro's advocacy in the investment of nursing and midwifery leadership persevered even during the Covid-19 pandemic, strengthening leadership capabilities, from the international institution level to regional policy and practice. Ms Iro's succession marks the end of an efficacious tenure; her legacy is reflected in current and subsequent generations of nursing and midwifery leaders.

Join the Nursing and Midwifery Global Community of Practice



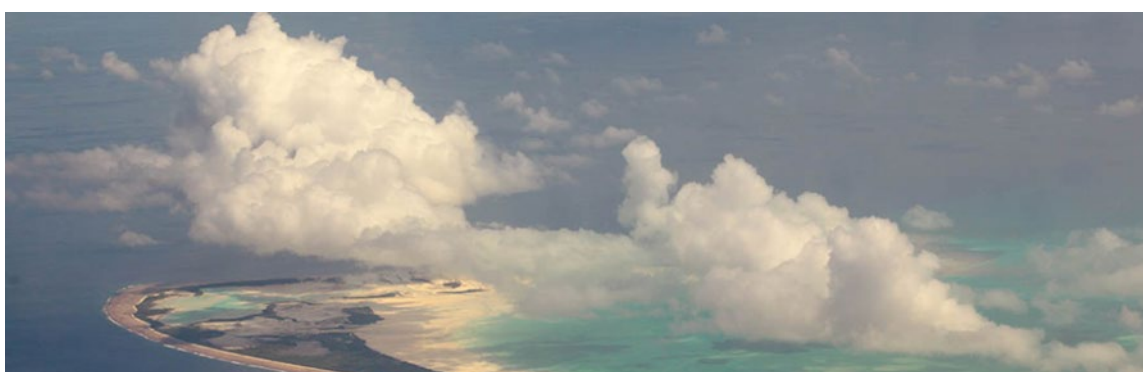

WHO Climate Change Conference

6 – 18 November 2022



The World Health Organization's Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP) took place in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt and saw formalised commitments to providing financial aid to the most adversely affected countries.

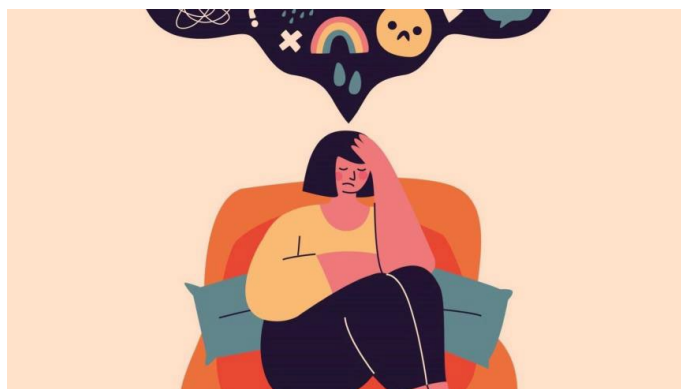
COP27 brought together more than 45,000 participants to share ideas and solutions, and to build partnerships and coalitions. Indigenous peoples, local communities, cities and civil society, including youth and children, showcased how they are addressing climate change and shared how it impacts their lives.

The bloc has agreed to the creation of a dedicated loss-and-damage fund that will enable developing countries to access immediate financial aid in the event of climate catastrophe.

International Council of Nurses endorses WHO training programme on improving mental health

10 November 2022

The World Health Organization's Quality Rights e-training programme on mental health, recovery and community inclusion has been endorsed by the International Council of Nurses (ICN) and meets the standard for accredited nursing continuing education points. The course, which is available in 11 languages, covers a full range of issues including taking care of one's own mental health, supporting friends, family and colleagues with their mental health, and tackling stigma, discrimination, abuse and coercion in mental health services.



ICN President Dr Pamela Cipriano said: "Training nurses to better support the mental health and wellbeing of the people they care for can make an enormous difference to individuals' quality of life. This targeted training programme is easy to access and members of the nursing family who complete it will also gain personal benefits from the lessons they learn. It is very timely because we know that nurses everywhere suffered distress during the pandemic. I encourage nurses everywhere to take the time to complete this programme for the good of their patients and for their own sakes."

WHO has an ambitious target for the global rollout of the Quality Rights e-training with the aim of training at least five million learners by the end of 2024, affecting the lives of 500 million people with mental health conditions or psychosocial disabilities.

These workshops have provided our colleagues with invaluable capacity building and professional development skills that will enable them to implement health workforce planning and policy within their countries. Secretariat Launch for the Global Network 17 November, 2022



Last November, key local, national, regional and global stakeholders joined to celebrate WHO CC UTS's new role of Secretariat for the Global Network of World Health Organization Collaborating Centres for Nursing and Midwifery (GNWHOCNM). Founded in 1988, the GNWHOCNM connects 44 WHO Collaborating Centres and network partners to advance Health for All through excellence in nursing and midwifery. In attendance were colleagues from across UTS, including Vice-Chancellor Professor Andrew Parfitt, key partners from the National Department of Health Papua New Guinea, Pacific Island Ministries of Health, WHO Western Pacific Regional Office, and WHO Headquarters, as well as participants from 42 WHO Nursing and Midwifery Collaborating Centres. Overall, 42 countries across the globe were represented, including industry partners: Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency, Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council, Australian Nursing Council, Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation, ACT Health and the Australian Government Department of Health.

In 2005, AAAH, a regional partnership mechanism, was launched by 10 founding member countries in response to international recognition of the need for global and regional action to strengthen country capacity for human resource for health (HRH) planning and management. The AAAH is part of a larger movement to enhance HRH development as articulated in Kampala Declaration and the Agenda for Global Action.

AAAH coordinates with partners to strengthen joint efforts in advocating the HRH, provides technical support and augments country-level HRH development through regional collaboration. It aims to ensure sustained commitments addressing HRH needs through research and contribution to policy development.

Colleague of the Centre, Adjunct Professor James Buchan was a speaker/panellist at the 12th AAAH Conference which was held on 24-25 January 2023 in Bangkok, Thailand. He participated in the

session “Health practitioner regulation and continuing profession education: drawing lessons in supporting pandemic responses”.

Fourth Regional Forum of WHO Collaborating Centres in the Pacific

28- 29 November 2022



Working together to respond to the Region’s current and future health challenges was a key focus of the Fourth Regional Forum of WHO Collaborating Centres in the Western Pacific.

Health experts from academic and other institutions across Asia and the Pacific who gathered in Siem Reap, Cambodia and online acknowledged the progress that has been made in strengthening collaborative and strategic partnerships with WHO in recent years. Representatives from more than 120 WHO collaborating centres in the Region also recognised the need to harness more innovative, integrated and cross-cutting approaches to drive country-level impact in line with *For the Future* (FtF) – the vision for WHO’s work with member states and partners in the Western Pacific Region.

The Forum culminated in a series of recommendations for WHO’s work with collaborating centres over the coming years. This included strategic planning to best leverage the breadth of expertise, capacities, networks and resources of collaborating centres, to broaden their contributions to the priorities set out in the Region’s *For the Future Vision*.

Launch: Inequality Monitoring in Sexual, Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health eLearning course

9 March 2023



Inequities in sexual, reproductive, maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health (SRMNCAH) throughout the world mean that certain population subgroups have systematically worse health outcomes and poorer access to services and interventions than others. Addressing inequities in SRMNCAH is central to achieving universal health coverage, protecting human rights, advancing gender equality, combating discrimination and improving the social determinants of health. Making progress in each of these areas is also vital to achieve WHO's Triple Billion targets and accelerate towards the health-related Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Regular monitoring and review of inequalities in SRMNCAH by stakeholders at regional, national and subnational levels is critical for evidence-based decision making. The results of this inequality monitoring can also be used as an input (alongside other forms of knowledge and evidence) to determine where efforts and resources are needed to improve health and well-being for disadvantaged subgroups.

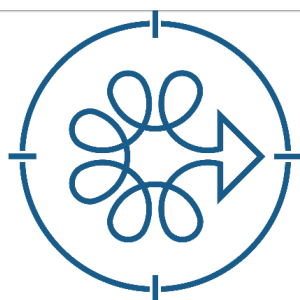
An information webinar launched the new WHO eLearning course: Inequality Monitoring in Sexual, Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health. The course introduces learners to a five-step approach to inequality monitoring in the context of SRMNCAH, preparing them to apply these steps across diverse contexts and settings. The two-hour, interactive eLearning course is delivered through OpenWHO.org, which hosts free, self-paced online courses on a variety of health topics.

The 76th World Health Assembly

21-30 May, 2023



The 76th World Health Assembly will take place in May 2023. The World Health Assembly is the WHO's decision-making body. Attended by delegations from all WHO member States, it focuses on a specific health agenda prepared by the Executive Board.

The main functions of the World Health Assembly are to determine the policies of the Organization, appoint the Director-General, supervise financial policies, and review and approve the proposed programme budget. The Health Assembly is held annually in Geneva, Switzerland.

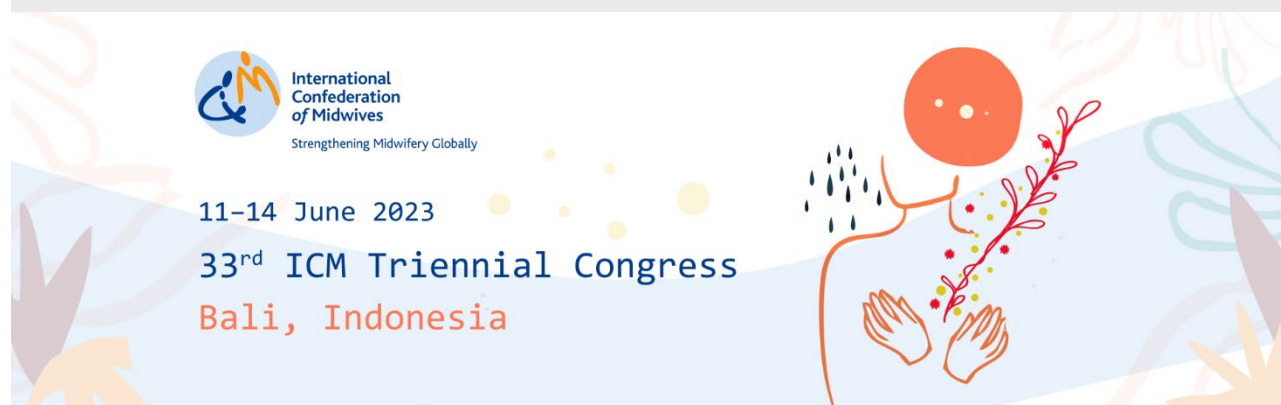
The items on the WHA76 agenda will likely include Public Health Emergencies: preparedness and response (including health emergency in Ukraine), Implementation of International Health Regulations (2005), Prevention and Control of Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD), UNGA high-level meetings preparation for Universal Health Coverage resolution and declarations on NCD and Mental Health, Influenza Preparedness, Polio Eradication Transition, and WHO's sustainable financing.

33rd International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) Triennial Congress

11 – 14 June, 2023



The theme for this year's 33rd ICM Triennial Congress will be "Together Again: From Evidence to Reality". The theme reflects the recent return to face-to-face engagement around the world, and points to the work undertaken to implement the evidence which continues to demonstrate the investment case for midwives. While this work must happen within the global community of midwives, it is also integral that governments, health leadership and women and people everywhere stand alongside midwives in their efforts to attain professional autonomy and decision-making authority at the country level.

The ICM Scientific Professional Programme Committee (SPPC) will develop a diverse programme of collaborative, innovative and interactive sessions led by global health, midwifery and maternal health advocates, scholars and leaders. With delegates, speakers and exhibitors from all over the world, this Congress is designed to not only support midwives in their professional development, but to support midwives as a collective to come together, build relationships, cultivate ideas, and identify pathways for progress.

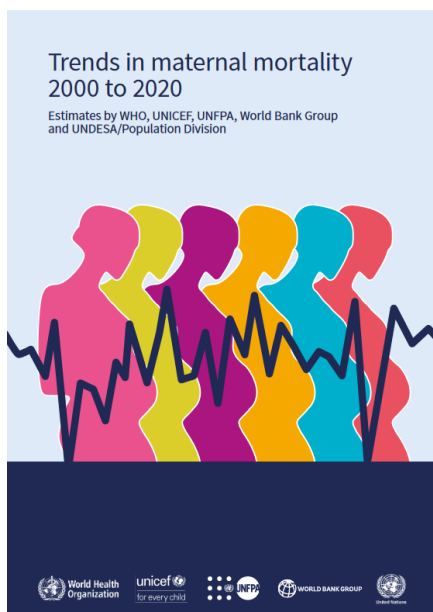

Recent Reports

Trends in Maternal Mortality from 2010- 2020

23 February, 2023



Every day in 2020, approximately 800 women died from preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth - meaning that a woman dies around every two minutes.

Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) target 3.1 is to reduce maternal mortality to less than 70 maternal deaths per 100 000 live births by 2030.

The United Nations Maternal Mortality Estimation Inter-Agency Group (MMEIG) – comprising WHO, the United Nations Children’s Fund, the United Nations Population Fund , the World Bank Group and the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs, Population Division– has collaborated with external technical experts on a new round of estimates covering 2000 to 2020. The estimates represent the most up-to-date, internationally comparable MMEIG estimates

of maternal mortality, using refined input data and methods from previous rounds.

The report presents internationally comparable global, regional and country-level estimates and trends for maternal mortality between 2000 and 2020.

Basic Psychological Skills: An Online Training for COVID-19 Responders



Since the Centre launched the new online course on Basic Psychosocial Skills in March 2021, we have been overwhelmed by the number of people who have completed the course. The Basic Psychosocial Skills Online Training is a free program designed to build resilience and mental health wellbeing for first responders and frontline health staff.

The free online course:

1. Focuses on personal well-being.
2. Explores supportive communication in everyday interactions.
3. Provides a practical framework to enable first responders to support others to problem solve and make healthy decisions.
4. Examines how to recognise emotional patterns and provide support to individuals.
5. Provides a certificate on completion.

FAQs

How many resources are provided in the Basic Psychosocial Skills training program?

The program provides 3 resources: guidance report, short online course and presentation with facilitation notes.

How many languages is the guidance offered in?

While the online course is only in English, the guidance report is provided in 28 languages.

Is the online course time-bound?

No. The online course is self-paced and takes an average of 3 hours to complete with a short quiz and a certificate awarded.



On 20 June 2022, the WHO Global Learning Laboratory launched the new WHO Quality Toolkit via webinar.

The WHO Quality Toolkit is a new online resource that provides tools to improve the quality of health services at a national, subnational, facility and community level. It provides a structured, system-based approach to identifying applicable materials needed for a specific context.

The Toolkit accompanies the *WHO Quality Health Services: a planning guide*, which has provided a roadmap for taking action within healthcare systems. The system incorporates key WHO tools and materials and is updated periodically to reflect new information to improve the quality of health services. It is intended as a user-friendly, practical tool for all healthcare workers.
