Almost 3 years ago I had the honour of being appointed as the inaugural Head of the School of Public Health. During this tenure, I have been inspired by the passion and dedication of the School's staff and students. We have gone through a particularly difficult period caused by the pandemic, maintaining our values throughout, and working hard to sustain our success.

In the pages that follow you will see why the School's reputation continues to grow, such as the recognitions and accomplishments of Professor Faye McMillan (AM) being appointed as the Deputy National Rural Health Commissioner, as well as being awarded the 2022 Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) Australian Pharmacist

of the Year. Faye was also successful in being awarded a Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) Indigenous Health Research Fund Grant. Dr Amie Steel was awarded a prestigious 4-year Australian Research Council (ARC) Future Fellowship and Associate Professor Anne Grunseit was awarded a National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) Ideas Grant.

In teaching and learning, the School continues to provide world-class education across our undergraduate and postgraduate programs. Not only did student enrolment numbers continue their increasing trend, but student feedback was impressive. Of

particular note was Dr Shannon Lin's Diabetes Education and Management course, which was recognised by UTS as an 'Outstanding and Commendable Course'. We were also very proud of our PhD students who successfully completed their studies, including Edward Ameyaw, Phillip Cottingham, Anna Doab, Alastair Gray, Bobby Porykali, and Deborah Stockton.

Our research endeavours continued to flourish. We had our most successful year to date in terms of research income (\$4.9M) and we maintained our impressive level of high-quality publication output (155 peer reviewed publications).

Engagement with our industry, community and professional organisation partners is vital for the enhancement of our teaching and learning activities as well as for the guidance of our future research activities. Thus, it was pleasing to see so many new partnerships established in 2022 alongside the continued work with our wonderful existing partners.

We were excited to welcome several new academic staff members in 2022. Professor Faye McMillan and Dr Demelza Marlin joined our Girra Maa Indigenous Health discipline. Associate Professor Anne Grunseit and Dr Albie Sharp, Associate Professor Kris Rogers, Dr Leonie Cranney, and Dr Claire Rogers all joined our Public Health discipline. 



Research Achievements in 2022

SoPH Research Capacity

The School houses 35 academics. All SoPH academic staff are research active as aligned and relative with their specific workload mix and level of appointment. The School is privileged and fortunate to also house the Girra Maa Indigenous Health Discipline which continues its significant and broad contributions across research, impact, community partnerships and governance.

A core focus for SoPH is to do all possible to support and develop academic talent across public health and health services management.

Publications Overview

In 2022, SoPH academics authored 155 peerreviewed publications. In 2022, SoPH academics co-authored with numerous colleagues from across UTS (with coauthorship both across other Schools in the Faculty of Health including Sport and Exercise Science, Graduate School of Health and Nursing and Midwifery and across other Faculties including FEIT, Science, ISF and DAB).

Moreover, many of the peer-reviewed publications also involved co-authorship and collaboration with a range of academics from across and beyond Australia (including co-authors from Canada, the US, Hong Kong, Germany, the UK, Italy, New Zealand, Sweden, Thailand, Brazil, and Denmark amongst many others). Our extensive research publication output also illustrates excellent co-authorship success across our HDR student-HDR supervisor teams — an achievement supported by our 2022 HDR research funding initiative to encourage submission to open-access, Q1 publications.


Research Grants and External Research Income

In 2022, SoPH academics attracted in excess of \$4.9M in external research income across all research categories of funding (1-4) including major NHMRC and ARC awards to UTS. Overall, SoPH staff were named on over \$76M of external research income. School researchers also attracted more than \$350K of philanthropic and industry support in 2022 (including gifts from Osteopathy Australia, Swedish Osteopathic Association, Osteopathy Foundation, Massage and Myotherapy Australia and Vital.ly amongst others). Teaching and Learning Course Reports

Bachelor of Health Science

In 2022, the Bachelor of Health Science program experienced another productive year. The second cohort was welcomed to the program's updated version, which included a full return to on-campus teaching across all years and subjects. Although COVID-19 restrictions were mostly lifted throughout the year, the pandemic still presented challenges for staff and students, leading to an increased demand for pastoral care and learning support.

The implementation of new majors in Health Promotion, Indigenous Health, and Public Health continued to be a focus in 2022. The program started offering students the first subjects in these new majors, providing more options for students to specialise and tailor their studies to their interests, career goals and industry expectations.

In an effort to improve the program's teaching and learning approaches, a peer review process was established in 2022. The process involved an emphasis on community- and team-driven approach to teaching and learning, and all core subjects were reviewed. The feedback from the School of Public Health and the wider university teaching community was positive, demonstrating our commitment to excellence.

Moreover, the school took steps to futureproof its undergraduate offerings by consulting with students and faculty to rename the program to the 'Bachelor of Public Health.'

Additionally, the school developed a suite of new double degree programs with the Business School and the Transdisciplinary School, set to launch in 2023.

Graduate Certificate in Diabetes Education

In 2022, the Graduate Certificate in Diabetes Education continued with its strong growth with the aims of providing students with the best-evidenced knowledge and skills to become diabetes educators. We continued to offer fully online teaching with face-to- face clinical placement across Australia with additional face-to-face workshops to suit the diversity of needs from students.

We taught four subjects with over 300 students. The course continued to play a vital role in strengthening the diabetes workforce capacity in Australia as evidenced by its successful gaining another three-year reaccreditation from the Australian Diabetes Educators Association (ADEA) which applauded the course as the most outstanding course in Australia. This is a testament to the quality of teaching and learning from the course. In addition, the course successfully retained six Indigenous students as well as attracted philanthropies to support those Indigenous students. This is an important achievement, as it reflects the school's strategic goals to commit to inclusive teaching and Indigenous health.

Besides, the course maintained high industry involvement, with over 40 industry representatives involved in the course. This highlights the commitment the course has to well prepare our graduates to be work-ready while continuing to increase its impact and collaboration with the industry.

Master of Public Health

It has been a great year for the Master of Public Health. Our student numbers have continued to grow, and student retention is excellent. Joining with Keypath and moving the MPH online has increased visibility

and access to students outside of Sydney, leading to an increase in students from other States and Territories across Australia, including rural and urban areas. Our student body continues to be diverse in terms of academic and professional background, which adds to the richness of the course.

The feedback from students enrolled in the MPH, as well as the graduate Certificate and Graduate Diploma of Public Health, and the Graduate Certificate in Public Health and Communicable Disease has been excellent. The School of Public Health continues to work with UTS Online, and postgraduate learning futures to develop new subjects and courses in 2023. We also have a continuous cycle of improvement with our existing subjects and strive for excellence in innovative, research informed teaching.

Health Services Management

2022 was a year of transformation for the Health Services Management team. With four full-time staff members, the team successfully delivered the Master of Health Services Management – now fully online – through COVID.

The team welcomed 85 new enrolments in 2022. The team was awarded the UTS Learning and Teaching Award "Learning Futures Team Category for Health OPM: A paradigm shift in learning and teaching." Our lead in health data, Janelle Craig was also awarded the School's Excellence in Teaching prize.

During 2022, the HSM team provided supervision to 17 PhD students, with two graduating during the year.

During 2022 HSM has continued to collaborate with Indigenous colleagues to embed Indigenous ways of knowing, being, and doing in a core subject in the HSM program for students to meet the Indigenous Graduate Attributes. Students report changes in hearts and minds and a commitment to "doing things differently" to address inequities experienced by Indigenous Australians. Planned changes to subjects in 2023 will embed Indigenous ways of knowing, being and doing in other core HSM subjects in 2023.

Suyin and Deborah participated in FoH PRESS PLAY - a cultural capability community of practice in the FoH. They completed Griffith University's Yuwahn Wupin ('culturally able' in Yugambeh) online modules to develop and deepen their cultural capability.

In recognition of her sustained contribution to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health and well-being in teaching and service, Deborah was invited to join the Dean and eight other FoH leaders at the Aboriginal Medical Service Redfern 50th Anniversary Gala Dinner in November 2022. This event celebrated leadership achievements by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and inspired us to keep working on our strategies and directions.

Girra Maa Indigenous Health Discipline

During 2022, Girra Maa Indigenous Health
Discipline staff excelled across research,
teaching and learning, community engagement,
and service to UTS. Throughout 2022 Girra Maa
was led by Professor Megan Williams —
Wiradjuri and lecturer Danielle Manton —
Barunggam, employing Ngiyampaa Dr Mark
Lock 0.4 FTE from February to September. We
welcomed Dr Demelza Marlin — Wiradjuri in
March at

0.4 FTE and Professor Faye McMillan AM – Wiradjuri in October as 0.6 FTE in addition to her 0.4 role as Deputy National Rural Health Commissioner (Allied Health and First Nations Health).

In 2022 Girra Maa staff were named on research successfully funded to a total of over \$72 million dollars. These projects aim to pursue Indigenous peoples' solutions to rectify major social issues including systemic racism in prisons and child protection and violence against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women.

Girra Maa staff also worked on other research funded by the MRFF, NHMRC, ARC, industry and governments, generally with a focus on social and emotional wellbeing, sovereign relationships, decolonising methodologies and measures for success. Research was partnered with Queensland Health, Brisbane Youth Detention Centre, Ted Noffs Foundation, Mibbinbah and The Glen, for example.

Girra Maa staff were active in publishing and research translation including through the Yuwinbir Special Issue of Health Sociology Review as Associate Editors in collaboration with the NHMRC Centre for Research Excellence in Strengthening Systems for Indigenous Research Equity (MW and DM). Team members held Associate Editor roles of Australian Journal of Rural Health (FM), PLOS Global Public Health Section – Indigenous Health (FM) and Current issues in Criminal Justice (MW). Media engagements included the ABC and SBS (MW) as well as Croakey Health Media (MW and DM), particularly in relation to the coronial inquest of Aboriginal woman Veronica Nelson.

The Australasian Evaluation Society included in their Cultural Safety Framework the Ngaa-binya Aboriginal evaluation framework (MW), and Girra Maa staff presented at the National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation conference (FM), International Corrections and Prisons Association Conference in Orlando, Florida (casual team member Dr Kevin Bradley), Informa National Health Workforce Summit, Services for Rural and Remote Allied Health (SARRAH) National Conference (FM) and St Vincent's Health Australia forum on drug law reform (MW).

Among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community-controlled services, Girra Maa staff held advisory roles with the Aboriginal Drug and Alcohol Residential Rehabilitation Network (DM), Yerin Empowerment Committee (DM), The Glen for Women residential drug and alcohol rehabilitation centre Working Party (DM), Deadly Connections (MW) and Mibbinbah (MW).

Girra Maa staff held roles on national and state committees including Croakey Health Media (MW), National Prisoner Health Information Committee of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (MW). Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network Human Research Ethics Committee (MW), Corrective Services NSW Aboriginal Advisory Council (MW), Aboriginal Working Group-Patient Reported Outcome Measures for the NSW Agency for Clinical Innovation (ML), Equally Well Project Management Committee (ML) and Our Yarning Advisory Group (Library for All) (ML), NSW Health's Health Education Training Initiative (HETI) Aboriginal Allied Health Network Steering Committee (DM) and the Australian Physiotherapy Council Accreditation Committee and Reconciliation Working Party (DM), National Mental Health Workforce Strategy Taskforce (FM), NSW Mental Health Community Advisory Council (FM), Puggy Hunter Memorial Scholarships (FM) and Australian Pharmacy Council (FM).

In terms of service to UTS, Girra Maa facilitated 'Press Play' cultural capability training among 20 Faculty staff with a community of practice formed (DM). Girra Maa staff also contributed to Faculty strategic and budget development, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff recruitment, including launching Get REDI – Get Recruiting into Every Discipline Indigenous Academics. Girra Maa promoted tasks for all staff identified in the Faculty Indigenous Education, Research and Employment Strategy and contributed to SPH and other UTS colleagues understanding industry accreditation

needs about Indigenous health. In October Girra Maa joined with many others around Australia welcoming cultural safety into legislation, and began providing information to colleagues about implications for curriculum and staff training.

Girra Maa staff engaged with marketing of subjects and scholarships, provided advice about engaging with philanthropists, and about cultural property rights. Girra Maa produced a calendar of events significant to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, and a guide to NAIDOC.

Girra Maa contributed to Jumbunna's draft Indigenous student research guide, supervised seven RHD students and presented at the Chancellor's Post-doctoral scholarship forum.

Girra Maa held its own warm and welcoming morning tea, and hosted the annual ADARRN Symposium at UTS with over 60 community and government attendees (DM). Girra Maa also joined with faculty staff at the Redfern AMS 50th anniversary gala event.

Girra Maa contributed to other UTS colleagues' gatherings including the INSIGHT Digital Collaborative Stakeholder Roundtable, the Scaling Climate Impact focus group and the Work Integrated Learning and Teaching Forum.

Girra Maa supported colleagues across UTS in planning, reviewing and implementing curriculum and assessments to meet the Indigenous Graduate Attribute, and assisted with various Course Intended Learning Outcomes updates.

In addition to assisting others in teaching and learning, Girra Maa successfully delivered one postgraduate and two undergraduate subjects and prepared an additional two new subjects for 2023 offerings for the Major of Indigenous Health in the Bachelor of Health Science.

Girra Maa encouraged colleagues to continue using its wattleseed artwork,
Acknowledgement of Country video, ethical research planning kit and tips for terminology when communicating with and about
Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities.


