The UTS Centre for Social Justice & Inclusion is offering 14 Social Impact Grants – Community-engaged research and practice in 2024.

Social Justice at UTS

The UTS Social Impact Grants – Community-engaged research and practice support researchers and practitioners to work with communities to contribute to positive social change.

Social justice is front and centre in UTS's vision of being a leading public university recognised for its global impact. Social justice is also a core component of the [UTS strategic plan](#). This focus has already created a rich array of successful [research and practice efforts that contribute to communities locally and globally](#).

UTS developed a [Social Impact Framework](#) that seeks to further enable the university's social justice profile and inform social justice priorities into the future. The framework identifies pathways necessary for UTS to:

- achieve a shared social justice purpose
- be an agent for social change
- contribute to the positive transformation of communities through research, education, and practice.

Achieving this purpose will contribute to the university's social justice vision of a healthy, sustainable, and socially just society through increased public benefit, increased social mobility and equity, and enabling environments for communities to thrive.

A key pathway to this vision, as identified in the Social Impact Framework, is the necessary reward, recognition, and support for staff. In response to this, and as part of its broader work to enable and enhance social impact research and practice



at UTS, the Centre for Social Justice & Inclusion runs the Social Impact Grants program.

Social Impact Grants – Community-engaged research and practice

The **2024 Social Impact Grants – Community-engaged research and practice** are focused on supporting community-engaged research and practice. Grant recipients must work in reciprocal partnership with the community to drive the purpose, design, implementation, and use of research or practice.

The grants must also demonstrate UTS's contribution to social impact in line with the [Social Impact Framework](#). Accordingly, grant applications must articulate how projects will contribute to the transformation of community(ies), and respond to one or more of the desired impact areas:

- A healthier, more sustainable, and socially just society.
- Increased public benefit.
- Increased social mobility and equity.
- Enabling environments for communities to thrive.

The grants can include:

- research projects
- teaching and learning projects
- initiatives and events that build the culture of inclusion and social justice at UTS
- initiatives that support collaborations between UTS and the communities that we are connected to other projects that further the purpose and vision of the Social Impact Framework.

The grant can be used flexibly to fund entire projects, or for aspects of initiatives. For example, it could help progress a project from the ideation phase to the delivery phase. It could be used as a catalyst to progress a current project or to help evaluate a project.

Successful grants will have their projects showcased through a [case study published on the UTS website](#).

In 2024, we have two categories of grants:

- Research and Practice Grant.

- Local Community Voice Grant.

Applicants may apply for either a general Research and Practice grant, or a Local Community Voice Grant.

Local Community Voice Grant

The Local Community Voice Grant is for projects in the suburbs surrounding UTS – Glebe, Pyrmont, Haymarket and/or Ultimo. It is an opportunity for applicants to undertake projects in our local community that respond to one or more of the following community identified priority areas:

- How might we influence attitudes and behaviours in our community to create a sustainable and thriving environment?
- How might we use public spaces more effectively to connect people in our community?
- How might we ensure that community voice informs decision making?
- How might we ensure that people have affordable and adequate housing so that everyone in our community feels safe?
- How might we improve public transport so that it is accessible and meets the needs of our community?

Proposed projects and community partners must be based in Glebe, Haymarket, Pyrmont or Ultimo,

If your project responds to the above areas, please consider submitting your project for a Local Community Voice Grant.

Application details

Who can apply?

To be eligible to apply for a Social Impact Grant – Community-engaged research and practice, applicants must:

- be a UTS staff member (academic or professional), or a UTS student (undergraduate or HDR).
 - **Note on student applications:** As a condition of the grant, students must identify an academic or professional staff supervisor for their project. Funds will be dispersed to the staff members involved who will take joint responsibility.
- Group applications are welcome.

How much is the grant for?

Each grant recipient will be awarded up to \$5,000 including on-costs.

Payments will be transferred to the staff member's faculty or unit for disbursement. As part of the application process, all applications will need to include an indication of how the grant will be spent.

Are there any conditions of the grant?

Successful applicants will be required to attend one three-hour evaluation workshop on either:

- Monday 20 May 2024, 9.30am to 12.30pm (Face-to-face on the UTS campus)
- Thursday 23 May 2024, 9.30am to 12.30pm (Online).

All grants will need to be financially acquitted by **8 December 2024**.

Research projects and practice initiatives need to be near completion by January 2025.

A final report must be submitted by **28 February 2025**.

When are applications due?

Applications are due **COB 12 April 2024**.

When will successful applicants be notified?

Successful applicants will be notified by **10 May 2024**.

How will the applications be assessed?

In 2024, there are two streams of grants:

- Research and Practice Grants.
- Local Community Voice Grants.

Grant applications for each stream will be assessed according to the following criteria:

1. Project aligns with the purpose and vision of the UTS Social Impact Framework.
2. Project has the potential to contribute to the positive transformation of communities.
3. Project lead/team has partnered with a community organisation and/or external stakeholder.
4. Project lead/team demonstrates significant engagement with the community partner to identify need and design the project.
5. Intended beneficiaries will have considerable involvement in the project.
6. Intended outcomes of the project are clear and achievable within the timeframe and resources.
7. There is a clear and detailed approach to demonstrate the outcomes of the project, and this approach includes partner and beneficiary perspectives.
8. Project activities and intended use of funding is detailed, clear and achievable within the timeframe and resources.
9. There is a clear indication of how the project findings will be disseminated.
10. Project lead and/or team have existing expertise within the subject area.
11. Potential risks and how to address them are clearly identified.
12. Project has been endorsed by the faculty Dean/Unit Director/Supervisor.
13. **Local Community Voice Grant:** All projects must meet all the above criteria, and additionally:
 - a. Projects must be in partnership with an organisation/group in the Glebe, Haymarket, Pyrmont and/or Ultimo areas.

- b. Intended project outcomes must benefit the Glebe, Haymarket, Pyrmont and/or Ultimo communities.
- c. Projects must seek to address at least one of the five community-identified priority areas:
 - i. Ensuring community voice informs decision making.
 - ii. Influencing attitudes and behaviours to create a sustainable and thriving environment.
 - iii. Using public and private spaces to effectively connect people.
 - iv. Ensuring affordable and adequate housing.
 - v. Improving public transport.

Successful 2023 Social Impact Grant recipients will not be considered for a similar application in the 2024 round.
