Welcome to Issue 11 of the Palliative Care in Prisons (PiP) Project Newsletter.

It's been an exciting period of progress since our last update, and we're thrilled to share the latest developments with you. Firstly, I'm delighted to introduce <u>Dr. Stephanie Edwards</u> as our new Project Coordinator, who joined us in February 2024. Stephanie brings invaluable expertise in psychology, with a focus on mental health, substance use, and HIV research and ethics. You'll have the chance to meet her during our upcoming project group meetings.

In late 2023, we had the privilege of participating in the Parliamentary Friends of Palliative Care event at Parliament House. This was followed by our engagement in the two-day National Palliative Care workshop, hosted by Palliative Care Australia with Commonwealth support. These events provided rich insights into other projects and fostered potential collaborations.

Expanding on this collaborative spirit, we recently convened a <a href="Queensland co-design workshop">Queensland co-design workshop</a>, held at QUT Kelvin Grove in February 2024. Through the Sydney and Brisbane co-design workshops, we have with our correctional services and justice health partners formulated proposed capacity-building strategies for the next 18 months, pending confirmation by the National Project Advisory Group.



Parlimentary Friends of Palliative Care

Our national Community of Practice initiative with a stimulating discussion on Voluntary Assisted Dying and its implications for individuals in prison, held on February 24, 2024. It was a pleasure to have Penny Neller, Lawyer, Project Manager at the National Palliative Care Projects Australian Centre for Health Law Research, QUT, and Andrew Wiley, Director of the SA Prison Health Service, join us and speak to the legal, ethical and practical aspects of operationalising this law in our prisons.

Additionally, we've received final governance approvals to gather remaining data from New South Wales and Victoria. We're in the last stages of securing approvals for data collection in Western Australia and commencing the process in Queensland. As we transition into the implementation phase and begin planning for the National Framework, your continued input and engagement are invaluable.

Thank you for your ongoing dedication and support as we work towards our project goals.




#### PROJECT PARTNER BIOGRAPHY
