Annual Green Hero Awards

2013 Nominations

The Annual Green Hero Award winners will be announced on 5 June World Environment Day. Below is a list of the (very impressive) nominees;

Vahid Vakiloroaya - Phd student developing energy efficient air con systems that save 50-60% of energy and cut greenhouse gas emissions.

Adwoa Humphreys – A passionate student advocate for sustainability, manages the Bluebird Brekkie Bar and organises weekly student welfare collective meetings.

Judy Friedlander – Postgrad researcher who has published extensively on the environmental impacts of meat and dairy production. Coordinates Meat Free Monday events.

Natasha Lay – Student actively involved in Australian Youth Climate Coalition helping empower young people to take action on climate change. Led youth delegation to UN 2012 Doha negotiations.

Pang Take Lim – The 'go-to' guy within DAB who helps reuse equipment and resources, keeping material out of land fill and saving the faculty money. (every faculty needs a Pang)

Adrian Bancilhon – IT whizz who helped install Greentrac software on the university's computers, saving \$250,000 per year in power bills, not to mention greenhouse gas savings.

David Murphy – Building manager who helped roll out new systems in building 10 including LED lighting, air con, smart meters, and improved procedures to reduce energy, water and gas use.

Alex Jackson – Another quiet hero who trudges into empty class rooms and turns off the lights and AV equipment, over and over and over again.

Kathryn Burton – Works in creative arts and recycles up to 100 canvasses year, removing staples, repairing and reframing each one so students can reuse – saving money and reducing landfill.

Scott McWhiter – Part of a team who developed and introduced online Ethics Application forms, so far cutting 8763 sheets of printing, saving money, time and trees.

Anna Stern – A personal inspiration to many of her colleagues advocating (and practicing) walking to work as a form of sustainable transport, with health and environmental benefits.

Chris Chapman – Chris has modified his suburban Mosman house so it generates more electricity than it uses. He is a personal inspiration to the next generation of young engineers.

Nicky Ison - Works at the Institute of Sustainable Futures on energy saving work and in her

'spare time' helps develop community renewable energy projects.

Rod Hahn – Another building manager who has been instrumental in upgrading new automated lighting systems, aircon controls and smart meters. Rumour has it he also collects and recycles cork from wine bottles – a time honoured but fading tradition.
